There was a video from the Sikh Heritage Museums of Canada, local author Victoria Bailey read from her book Mommy Lives Here & Daddy Lives There.



Yellow = Friendship




A Victorian Picnic: Wednesday, August 10th 2022





Museum Exhibits 2022





Emerging energetic & creative curators from the U of T partnered with the Museums of Mississauga to create the What Is Love exhibition at the Bradley Museum from April 29 - June 26, 2022. The exhibit was very inclusive and explored past and present love stories of Mississauga.

The colourful exhibit included personal stories, art work, neon lights, videos, photos, artifacts, interactive activities, the heirloom

dress and of course Teddy. Here are just a few examples of artifacts from the Museums of Mississauga collection:

Past:

This is an engagement photo of Arthur Harris & Mary Magrath. They were engaged in 1880.







When family members pass down heirlooms, they build connections with new generations and add new chapters to family histories.

Because these objects are full of meaning for their original owners, passing them down is a sign of deep love and trust. For the inheritor, the heirloom is a way to remember a loved one or share their experiences.

This wedding dress was originally worn by Mary Harris (neé Magrath) when she married Arthur Harris in 1881. The dress was later passed down to Mary's granddaughter Barbara Larson (neé Sayers), who wore it at least once, during a New Year's Eve party in 1966.



Museum Exhibits Cont.

This hand sewn teddy is wearing a royal blue cotton jacket with light blue and white striped pants.

The bear was originally given to Geoffrey Harris Sayers (1907-1997) for his first Christmas in 1907. It was used by both Dora and Barbara Sayers, his sisters.

Present:

Love can take many forms. The exhibition explored present day love through personal experiences described by Mississauga residents. Through friendships, family members, partners, communities and pets love has played a key role in our lives.





Exhibition: Tales of Textiles April 28 - May 22, 2022 was organized by The New Youth Council.

Each item of clothing told a story.

Some pieces of clothing were shared by members of the community.

Rarely seen garments from the Museums' permanent collection were also on display throughout the second floor of Benares Historic House.

This man's black wool suit and matching vest belonged to Emilio F. Barbisan (1903 -1963) an Italian immigrant. Emilio purchased the suit in 1929. This suit is part of The Museums of Mississauga collection.

Zunera Ishaq came to Canada in 2008 from Pakistan and settled in Mississauga.

This niqab & abaya was worn by Zunera Ishaq during her Canadian Citizen Ceremony on October 9th, 2015.

Zunera garnered national attention as she wished to wear her niqab while taking the Citizenship Oath. She was willing to remove the veil for purposes of identification but refused to remove it during the public ceremony. After a 2 year battle she received permission to take the oath in a private office and was able to vote at the federal election shortly thereafter. These garments are part of the Museums of Mississauga collection.

The exhibit displays compelling photographs and stories created by Mississauga residents, perspectives from international scientific leaders and information on how you can take climate action today!



shared information about medicinal teas and plants. Tours included storytelling, traditional songs & guests made pressed flower buttons.

Saturday June 18th was the Open Market at Benares. Just under 500 people attended. Food Donations to Compass were accepted in-lieu of admission fees. The community was really generous. The donations totaled 483 lbs in food and over \$200.00 in cash.













Free food samples such as tacos and strawberry salsa were handed out.

Alana and Leigh Cline provided toe tapping entertainment on the verandah.

Elder Mark Sault from the Mississauga of the Credit First Nations informed guests about medicinal teas and plants.

Exhibits & vendors included: a beading exhibition, plus Naomi Smith, Black Tulip Designs, Shade of Miti, Akachi Farms, Tataki Zome Workshop with Khadija Aziz, Plant Personality, Peel Art Gallery, Museums and Activities, Bodies of Earth: Consciously- Made Clothing, Steve's Bees, and tasty freshly cooked mini pancakes.



Ten formal kimonos were presented to The City of Mississauga by the City of Kariya in honour of the opening of the Living Arts Centre in 1997. Mississauga has been twinned with Kariya City, Japan since July 7th, 1981.

The word kimono literally means "thing to wear".

Kimonos are T-shaped, straight-lined robes that cover the wearer from neck to ankle.

They are wrapped from left to right and tied with a belt called an obi.


Today kimonos are mainly worn by women on special occasions. An unmarried woman would traditionally wear a style of kimono called furisoe which has floor length sleeves.

This example is decorated with Nandina leaves. Nandina is a bush found in Japan that often has clusters of berries. It is believed that the Nandina have the power to make bad fortune disappear and so the plant appears often in motifs of family crests and textile designs.

The crane is one of the most popular birds that are depicted on kimonos. Symbolically they represent long life and good fortune as cranes are believed to live for a thousand years and to 'inhabit the land of the immortals.'
