MEMORIAL 1936 - 2021

Wendy Davies will be remembered for the enthusiasm with which she tackled every challenge. She helped lead the Bradley House Advisory Committee and later went on as one of the directors of the Friends of the Museums of Mississauga (FOMM). When the City initiated an advisory board to assist with a long term management plan for the Museums, (MOMAC) Wendy was on hand to Chair that committee.

When the Bradley Museum undertook to bring the old log cabin from Port Credit to its current home at Bradley, Wendy jumped on the project with her usual enthusiasm. Fundraising was essential: The cabin was in great disrepair and the City felt that responsibility for bringing it up to current building standards should be a community responsibility. That became a major project for the Bradley Advisory Board.

Wendy initiated the idea of the annual "Starlight and Candlelight" Banquet which over the 15 years of its existence raised many thousands of dollars for the Log Cabin, now a treasured addition of the Museums. Those of us who worked with Wendy in these early days, when the dinners were held in The Anchorage will remember the care that went into each aspect of those lovely evenings.



Ever the gracious and diligent hostess, Wendy held us to Downton Abbey standards. I remember her going to each table with a ruler to make sure that every piece of cutlery was in alignment and that every piece of crystal was polished to perfection.

Wendy's involvement in social, church, political and community activities are well recognized. She was a woman of unbounded enthusiasm and activity. She believed in a life well-lived. Her adored family, her Church, her love of tennis, her lovely home and garden, were the foundation upon which her life was built and her involvement in a broad span of other activities with a large number of dear friends ensured that she lived up to that philosophy.

We will miss Wendy, who had only recently returned to be a member of the Board after a brief hiatus to accept other challenges. I know this was because her love for these small museums tucked away amongst the beautiful trees of Clarkson could not be denied.


RECAP FROM: SUMMER OF 2021


Summer of 2021 continued:

U of T students of Masters of Museums study program created and presented this unique exhibit.



We Are Resilient that was outlined in the previous E - Newsletter continued throughout the summer.



We are excited for the next phase of the project – an outdoor exhibition – that will be unveiled in 2022. Keep an eye out through our social channels for updates on the project.





Recent Museum Donations







Although our doors have been closed, behind the scenes we have continued collecting and working to preserve Mississauga's history. Some key recent donations include a transfer of items from the Living Arts Centre. A guitar signed by the members of Triumph, concept drawings and memorabilia with the original logo will be used to celebrate LAC's 25th anniversary in 2022.

Al Betts (1924-2017) moved with his family to Streetsville in 1956 to work for A.V.Roe Ltd (Avro Arrow) in Malton. After its closure in 1959, Al started doing freelance and commercial photography running his own business until 1983. He was the primary photographer for the Streetsville Booster and Streetsville Review. We acquired his photography equipment which is a nice complement to PAMA's 6000 archival images created by Betts over his career.

The collections team have been working for over a year to acquire a Lee Enfield rifle made by Small Arms Division, Canadian Arsenals Limited. It belonged to Lloyd MacDonald, a long-time resident, who did two tours of duty during the Korean War. The gun was later given to his daughter Anita Bridges who sadly passed away in March 2020. Related donations from other donors include an ammunition box and a hand-made handkerchief kept in an envelope that reads "Help the Guild- to help the boys-who help Canada, Small Arms War Guild". We hope that one day soon these items will be on display at SAIB as renovations plans develop.

We engaged in some contemporary collecting by accepting a vial and syringe from the first COVID-19 vaccine administered in Peel Region on December 21, 2020. Trillium Health Partners (THP) was among the first hospitals in Ontario to administer the vaccine and we are so thankful they saved these items for us.

What is This?

This building is a Drive Shed and was used for storing farm equipment, tools and vehicles. It is a long storage building with multiple bays, which allowed many pieces of equipment to be accessible and organized at all times.

Fanning Mills (circa 1880s)

Mississauga was once a huge farming area, especially for soft fruit and grains. A key piece of equipment was the fanning mill that removed straw, chaff, stones, dirt and seeds from wheat, oats, rye and barley. The machine worked by using a series of mesh trays, one on top of the other, that moved back and forth with a fan blowing across them. Grain was fed through the top and passed through these trays trapping unwanted material. Also known as winnowing machines, many fanning mills were hand-cranked, but it was common to convert them to run by an electric motor in later years.

The yellow fanning mill dates to 1889 and was donated by Alan Skeoch in 2001.

Volunteers collected the red machine in the 1960s.

WORKING

Drive Shed Update

Recently we updated the display in the Drive Shed at Bradley Museum. We removed some of the items, created interpretive text specific to key artifacts and also removed some plexiglass to make the display more visible. We plan to continue with the improvements by adding a barrier at the bottom to stop leaves from collecting inside.


